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BOARD OF DIRECTORS COMMUNITY HEALTH INVESTMENT COMMITTEE CHARGE 2024

Purpose:

The Committee acts as an advisory body to the Board by identifying and vetting opportunities to invest public funds in programs and services that will address the health needs of its constituents. The Committee's work is guided by the Board's vision, mission, and strategic direction and helps to ensure the District's investments address priority needs and achieve measurable improvements in the health outcomes of its residents.

The Committee advises the Board on District programs such as, but not limited to: Annual Community Grants, Community Education, multi-year Special Initiative recommendations, and Workforce Tuition Assistance.

Primary Functions:

- 1. Advising Board on community needs and District-proposed programs and projects to address those needs.
- 2. Conducting an annual review of the District's Community Health Investment programs.
- 3. Evaluating proposals for new Community Health Investment programs and Special Initiatives proposed by the Board, Strategic Direction Committee or District Staff.
- 4. Serving as the primary workgroup for the District's Community Grants Program including reviewing processes and procedures, reviewing, and evaluating grantee proposals, making funding recommendations to the Board, and reviewing grantee reports.
- 5. Serving as ambassadors to the District by promoting the District's Community Health Investment programs and services to the community.

Membership:

The Committee is comprised of two representatives from the District Board and a minimum of six active community leaders that reflect a range of professional skills and experience in such areas as health care, social services, grantmaking, development, and public policy and represent the geography of the District, as well as racial, ethnic, and gender diversity of constituents. The District's Strategic Initiatives Director (SID) will serve as staff to the Committee. The District's CEO and SID will serve as non-voting members.

The Committee will be chaired by a Director of the PHCD Board. As an advisory body to the Board, the Board retains approval authority. Community Committee members serve 3-year terms and can be re-appointed for one 3-year term before cycling off for at least one year. As an exemption, for the 2023-2024 grant cycle, members were appointed for a one-year term. Returning members are up for consideration for 2 more years to complete a full term of three years.

Community Grants Program Policy, Guidelines, Eligibility

Policy

The Peninsula Health Care District exists to address the health needs of our residents. It carries this out through a vigilant monitoring of resident health and seeks opportunities to promote health, ensure access to needed health services, and achieve equity in health outcomes. It achieves this through a variety of health investment strategies from directly providing services and facilities to partnering with service providers through funding support to community-based organizations that address the identified needs of our residents. The Community Grants Program is one of the overall District community health benefit strategies established to recognize and support the essential contribution non-profit organizations make to the health ecosystem.

Our Approach

Peninsula Health Care District seeks organizations that share our mission to support our residents achieving their optimal health and wellness through education, prevention and access to basic health services. We view funding as a partnership. We acknowledge that each community has different strengths and challenges, and we work to tailor our support accordingly. The Community Grants Program is seeking innovative programs that:

- Align with the District's Mission, Vision, and Strategic Priorities
- Improve the health and well-being of District residents as demonstrated by measurable outcomes
- Emphasize a preventive approach
- Address health disparities and promote health equity
- Leverage additional funding to support the program
- Collaborate with other agencies or local government

Guidelines & Eligibility

- 1. Supports non-profit 501(c)(3) organizations and public agencies that will directly serve residents of San Bruno, Millbrae, Burlingame, Hillsborough, San Mateo, and/or half of Foster City and a small southeast corner of South_San Francisco.
- 2. Programs and services that fall within the scope of public health and health care.
- 3. Grants are made in the range of \$10,000 \$60,000.

- 4. Only one grant per applicant organization will be considered.
- 5. Organizations are eligible to apply for a one-year grant and will be required to make a mid-term and an end-of-term report.
- 6. Supports direct program costs and consideration given to indirect costs up to 12%.
- 7. Cannot be used for research projects, fundraising campaigns or events.
- 8. General operating support will be considered if metrics are identified to increase or improve reach and impact.



Bonnie Jue, DDS



Dr. Bonnie Jue is the Community Engagement Director of Sonrisas Dental Health, a non-profit organization dedicated to providing access to quality dental care and oral health education to underserved community members with dignity, respect, and compassion.

Dr. Jue develops clinic-based and mobile dental programs that serve individuals who face barriers to care in San Mateo County.

As an Associate Professor at the University of California San Francisco (UCSF) School of Dentistry, and a dental clinician in both private practice and community health centers for over 30 years, Dr. Jue has focused her career on addressing oral health disparities and improving access to care for underserved and vulnerable populations.

Because one's mouth is the entry way to the rest of the body, she enjoys educating people about how oral health impacts overall health and well-being.

Crystal Miran Bio

Crystal Miran, MSPAS, MPH, is originally from San Diego, CA. She earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology from the University of California, San Diego, in 2000. After graduation, she worked with Operation Samahan Health Clinic, a community clinic founded on the principles of providing culturally sensitive and quality healthcare to underserved and uninsured community members in San Diego County. There, she helped create programs aimed at reducing teen pregnancy, promoted health education and provided confidential health testing. In parallel, she worked at Planned Parenthood to support youth in a similar capacity. In 2009, Crystal graduated with her Masters degree in Physician Assistant Studies and her Masters degree in Public Health from Touro University.

Crystal has 15 years of experience working as a Physician Assistant, and 13 of those years have been at the San Mateo Medical Center Emergency Department. As an emergency health care provider, she cares for a wide range of patients whose needs affect their quality of life for preventative care and long-term wellness, and addresses emergency needs and hospitalization, as well as a myriad of social issues. Crystal views her patient's health as a partnership where she accepts the responsibility of care alongside their willingness and ability to move forward with a plan of shared-decision making: one's health is not one-sided, we must work together to optimize the health of our community.

Crystal has a particular interest and empathy in working with vulnerable populations, as she was raised in a household with an older sister who has a developmental delay. She watched as her parents advocated and worked tirelessly with so many partners (teachers, doctors, physical therapists, nurses, psychiatrists, social workers, and caregivers) to raise her sister, and overcome challenges and barriers to resources that vulnerable patients and their families often experience.

Crystal lives in San Mateo with her husband and 8-year-old son, and maintains her own health by exercising with her husband and friends, cooking/baking and trying new recipes, keeping up with her soccer-loving son, and reminding herself to practice gratitude and mindfulness.



Dr. Karrie D. Mitchell (she/her) has a lifelong record of serving the community to promote diversity, equity and inclusion. She has been serving as the Vice President of Planning, Research & Institutional Effectiveness at the San Mateo County Community College District since 2018. In this role, Dr. Mitchell provides guidance to the three colleges of the district on operationalizing the strategic plan and measuring the effectiveness of those efforts.

Prior to moving to San Mateo, she worked for over 15 years at Pima Community College in Tucson, Arizona in various roles

within administration, instruction, counseling and student life. It was there that she cofounded and served on the board of *Scholarships A-Z*, an organization focused on providing higher education to all students, regardless of immigration status.

Dr. Mitchell values giving back to the community and currently serves on the board as the Vice President of Operations and Risk Manager of the *San Francisco Bay Chapter of the Children's International Summer Village (CISV)*. In addition, she participates in the City of San Mateo's Team Up to Clean Up service team and was recognized by the San Mateo City Council (2023) for her contributions.

Dr. Mitchell holds a Ph.D. in Higher Education Organization and Administration from the University of Arizona, a M.S. in Counseling and College Student Personnel Administration from Kansas State University and a B.S. in Exercise Science from Northern Arizona University. She resides in San Mateo with her partner and various foster mutts from Muttville.
